When: Early High School Timeline

9th Grade

- Don't obsess over lists
- Convenience

- Listen to your student

10th Grade

Summer after 10th

- Start if you haven't already
- Continue if you have

When: Later High School Timeline

11th Grade

- Tour intentionally
- Narrow down your list
- Look at specifics
- Meet people
- Recruiting Pre-Reads
- Demonstrate interest!

Summer after 11th

- Carry On
- Visit again?
- Don't derail other plans
- Targeted visits

12th Grade Fall

- Finalize your list
- Early vs. Regular
- Application deadlines

Memorable quotations & moments


Take pictures



- What extracurricular activities/volunteer opportunities do you do?
- What do you do on the weekends?

Of Faculty & Staff...

- What do you like about your students here?

- How does your or your colleagues' work relate to _____ (a relevant interest of yours)?
- How could a student pursue their interest in here and later in their studies?

Sample Supplemental Essay Prompts

- Discuss an academic topic that you're excited to explore and learn more about in college. Why does this topic interest you'?
Topics could be a specific course of study, research interests, or any other area related to your academic experience in college.
- What academic areas most pique your curiosity, and how do the programs offered at suit your particular interests?
- Students entering often find that making their home in naturally invites reflection on where they came from.
Share how an aspect of your growing up has inspired or challenged you, and what unique contributions this might allow you to
make to the community.
- In one sentence, why?
- What aspects of our location are most compelling to you, and why?
values community and encourages students, faculty, staff and leadership to engage in respectful conversations that can
expand their perspectives and challenge their ideas and beliefs. As a prospective member of this community, reflect on how your
lived experiences will impact the conversations you will have in the classroom, the dining hall or other campus spaces. What
essons have you learned in life thus far? What will your classmates learn from you? How has your lived experience shaped you?
- What is it about that has led you to apply?
- Describe the unique qualities that attract you to the specific undergraduate College or School (including preferred admission and
dual degree programs) to which you are applying at How would that curriculum support your interests?
- How will opportunities at support your interests, both in and out of the classroom?
- Think about an ethical dilemma that you care about that our society is currently facing. This can be something happening in your
ocal community or more globally. How can an education help you prepare for and address this challenge?
- Describe why you are interested in joining the community. Consider your experiences, talents, and values to illustrate
what you would contribute to the community if admitted.
